Constituents

- Local Intelligence Hub Public opinion polls [national average]:
 - o Considering voting for a different party at the next election (compared to 2019) = 44% [38.2%]
 - Would be less favourable towards the Conservatives if they weaken climate policies = 71%
 [69.1%]
 - o Would prefer the next leader of the Conservatives to invest in renewable energy = 78% [72.2%]
 - Support renewable energy projects in their local area = 91% [85%]
 - Believe the government has increased investment in renewables over the past 5 years = 53% [51.9%]
 - o Believe the government should use wind & solar farms to reduce energy bills = 90% [84.2%]
 - Believe the government should continue to block onshore wind development = 20% [24.2%]
 - Consider climate change a high priority = 57% [53.9%]
 - o Mental health has been impacted by the cost of living crisis = 38% [41.6%]
 - Support net zero = 64% [60.6%]
 - Oppose net zero = 13% [12.7%]
 - Think the Conservative government do not understand the impact the cost of living crisis is having on people = 72% [68.0%]
- Indicative GBNS [Great British Nature Survey, The Wildlife Trusts and Defra Data Services Platform]:
 - o 73.5% respondents 'agree' or 'strongly agree' that the loss of nature is noticeably affecting them
 - o 61.8% respondents 'agree' or 'strongly agree' that climate change is noticeably affecting them
 - 47.1% respondents voted pollution as the most negative impact on nature in the UK
 - 26.5% respondents voted 'very' or 'somewhat effective' when asked "how effective are the National Government at protecting nature?"




